# Road Test of the 1928 Austin Roadster

The following is a report of a read test of the 1828 Austin Randster made by an engineer of the N.R.M.A. Technical Department. This report is given after careful trial and examination, and is made as comprehensive as circumstances will permit, in the helief that it will prove a useful guide to potential perchasers.

The arrangement for re-taining wheels and brake drums is very neat, taking all driving and braking stress on special study

forward conventional nature. If it is necessary to examine the rear axle parts the unit must be dismantled. The tappets, steering, magneto-timing, and other necessary adjustment points are well thought out.

Comments: This car gives a very good general performance, being capable of maintaining a fair average speed over good or indifferent surfaces with comfort and economy. No stop for any unintentional reason was When thoroughly warmed up there is a marked improvement in the power output. The brakes are ad-versely affected if too much lubricant is applied to front or rear axles, or if the retainers are defective. The lu-brication of the torque ball, and the forward propeller shaft ball-bearing contained therein, needs special study for each body design or spring setting. Owing to the fact that a straight line drive is the normal condition the pressure lubricator on the torque ball may not line up with the hole leading to the propeller shaft ball race. The oil level in the rear axle housing must not be excessive and should be check-ed regularly. The compensating pulley for the front brakes should be well lubricated. It is situated at the rear of the gear box. The speedemeter on the car tested was reading 4 per cent. fast. The total mileage of 115.4 has been calculated allowing this error. The suspension would have been improved with shock absorbers adjusted tighter. The brakes were in need of general adjustment.



The Oberon Tarana Heritage Railway was another interesting example of dedicated local countrymen who has spent 6 years in restoring the Oberon Branch line, originally opened in 1923, linking Oberon to Tarana, and when completed would be a major tourist attraction.
