The Sydney/Newcastle convoy









left Liverpool at 8am and travelled smoothly all the way to Goulburn after a nice morning tea at Marulan. Using their modern GPS technology to short cut through a new Goulburn suburb, they managed to get lost in the AV Jennings residential estate. It must have been hilarious watching a convoy of Austin 7 on trailers parading through the residential areas, coming out of dead end streets, doing merry-go-round at the roundabout and trying to figure out how to get back to the main road. They managed somehow to get on track to Crookwell, but before long, Mervyn Boatwright with his two Austin 7s on his truck , was stopped for a breathalyser test. We do not think we were missed; after a two hour kip, showered and refreshed, we enjoyed the piece of pizza on offer, then set off with the team to the theatre, aka, St. Bartholemew's Church where an annual amateur show, "The last night of the Proms 2016", was to be presented that evening. Featured were the "Camden Community Band", the "City of Wagga Rugby Male Voice Choir", and the Church Organ (electronic and very large) played by









the resident organist. We were also to hear from Eliza Stephens, a recent Crookwell High School Graduate and a very promising vocalist. The audience participated by joining the performers in the typically "Proms" patriotic songs with great vocal enthusiasm and waving of flags. Similar enthusiasm was shown for the huge supper placed before them in the hall at the conclusion of the show. Most of us retired very late!

Kath's programme for Saturday was also well sorted and packed with activities. The Austin crews were required to have their cars in place at Crookwell Memorial Park between the hours of 8.30 am and noon on Saturday morning to become part of a large static show including many other vintage and classic vehicles. The park is large with many trees and gardens, the A7 drivers chose parking in the shade allowing our group to just "sit and set the world aright" or to inspect the car-show entrants at our leisure.

For those prepared to brave the hot sun there was a country fair in progress in the showgrounds adjacent to the park. Entertainment was provided by a very competent brass band provided by the N.S.W. Fire Brigade which provided music for a varied range of tastes and their items were interspersed with songs from country singers/instrumentalists and a girl's marching group. There were also numerous food, drink and craft stalls.

At noon the important cars were released from the park. The A7 group dashed off to Kadwell farm on Grabben Gullen Road to see a ploughing demonstration using heavy work horses and to enjoy the farm tour, riding on









the tray of a truck. Judith and I missed the turn to the farm gate and found ourselves back at the Grabben Gullen Pub. By accident ---honestly! We arrived at the farm a little late, but in time to join the team as they headed for Kath and John's farm where afternoon tea was available and a Funkhana had been arranged for the A7s.

Again Paul reports:- "John and Kath arranged layouts for three events in a field. The first required the car to be driven straight to the end of the field, the driver to pick up a roll of newspaper and then to reverse and throw the newspaper into a bin located half way back to the start line . The second challenge was to drive as fast as possible to the end of the adjacent field, park the A7 into a car space at right angles to the direction of travel, and then to reverse into another car space on the opposite side of the field and finish by driving across a line at the entry to a second field. The fourth was to drive as slowly as possible around the perimeters of the third layout, the winner being the driver who took the longest time.
