Day 1 Saturday 8th April 2017

The much-anticipated Austin 7 National Tour finally kicked off with scores of Austins arriving from around Australia, about 250 adults and a dozen children have booked in for the memorable event to celebrate 95 years of the Austin from 1922 to 2017. There were 45 Queensland A7s, 26 A7s from NSW, 26 from Victoria, 15 from South Australia, 2 from Western Australia, 1 from Tasmania and 1 from the UK. All the A7s will be from the year 1925 to 1938 and include vintage Chummies, Ulsters, Roadsters, Vintage saloon, Swallow Saloons, Rubber Duck, Box Saloons, post vintage tourers and Roadsters, Nippy Sport, Ruby Saloons, Coupes, Vans, Vintage sport and a Cabriolet. What a display! Registration was at the Darling Downs Veteran and Vintage Motor Club Clubroom and everyone received a comprehensive tour pack with name tags, Entrant Booklet, and lots of goodies.

The welcoming dinner was at the University of Southern Queensland and everyone had a great time catching up with each other.

Day 2 Sunday 9th April 2017

Day 2 was the first day real day of the Tour following Registration and Welcome Dinner on the Saturday to bring everyone together and unite old friends.

The Queensland Club set a cracking pace right from the start which was maintained up to the Farewell Dinner and Presentations. Breakfast was provided for those who ordered it at the Tour HQ situated at the Darling Downs Veteran and Vintage Motor Club clubrooms from 7am each day, followed by a driver's briefing and departure for the Run of the day.

However, there was a Swap and Sell meet on this first day from 8am with participants setting up items for sale alongside their cars outside the Tour HQ. There was a lot of interest in the items on offer, handbooks, radiators, lights, magnetos amongst much more and it provided an opportunity for a meet and greet as well as much discussion on the finer points of Austin Sevens. After 9.30am people packed away their 'Seven goodies' and set off for the Austin 7 display at the Cobb & Co Museum downtown

All cars were parked in the field adjacent to the Museum with some of the more special and interesting examples along the front of the Museum and adjacent to the main entrance. These included lan Reece's 1925 Chummy, Kevin Harte's 1933 Van driven by Tom and Paul Boatwright's 1929 Chummy. The day had been very well publicised in Toowoomba and as a result drew large numbers of locals to look at more than a hundred little cars of every shape and size.

The Cobb & Co Museum was opened in 1965 by WRF (Bill) Bolton to display his collection of horse drawn-vehicles and memorabilia associated with Australia's legendary coaching company which was started in 1854 by Americans, Freeman Cobb, John Peck, James Swanton and John Lamber. In 1981 the Museum was destroyed by fire, but the vehicles were saved by local volunteers and firefighters. Following the fire, the Bolton collection was donated to the Queensland Museum by Bill Bolton's daughter Jenny. The Museum was rebuilt on the site of the old Toowoomba Showgrounds and was opened as the current Cobb & Co Museum in 1987.









All participants were able to both browse the assembled A7 cars and also walk through the Museum to see a wonderful display of horse drawn carriages and other vehicles used during the early days of settlement and through the Cobb & Co era. Wayne Styles gave two lectures to enthusiastic audiences on the life of Herbert Austin in the Museum area.

Lunch was provided at the Museum for those that had booked and this proved to be an opportunity to meet up with old friends and meet new members of the Austin 7 family.

During the morning there was a Ladies High Tea served at the historic Toowoomba Railway Station. All those attending dressed in the Tour theme of the Roaring 1920s and there were some wonderfully colourful dresses and hats on display later in the day down at the Cobb & Co Museum. By all accounts the event, which was booked out, was very successful and a magnificent High Tea was served to the ladies.

Day 3 Monday 10th April 2017 -The Pioneer Village Museum at Highfields, Lunch at Goombungee, Alpaca farm, 2nd2none Winery & Colonial Woodcraft

The tour organisers were possibly little anxious at the start of the first touring day but they needn't have been. Every detail had been meticulously planned and, as it unfolded, the event very well executed. As with the welcome dinner and the Cobb & Co museum display on the previous day, the Queensland hospitality was as warm as the weather and a 54 mile undulating run through the Darling Downs was just what our baby Austins craved.

Most departed soon after an informative driver briefing by Lindsay at tour headquarters and flag off by the Toowoomba Mayor. I was one that failed to proceed and required assistance from tail end charlies, Sir Albert (Variety) and Geoff from the Veteran and Vintage Motor Club. Fortunately for me, my problem was just a battery. Whilst being ferried around Toowoomba for a replacement, we stopped off to assist other Austin 7 drivers with more serious ailments, but nothing seemed to be a problem for Geoff. Two roadside assists and a tow back to headquarters were just the norm and he was very happy to help. Thanks again Geoff and another tour detail well planned!

Finally, on the road again, I had a few miles to catch up. Once clear of the roadworks on Gowrie Junction Road I was able to make up time to meet up at for morning tea at the Highfields Pioneer Village.

The Pioneer Village offered an amazing insight into the emergence of the Darling Downs as a food source for the country, a remarkable display and indeed a magnificent morning tea!

From Highfields it was a picturesque 14 mile run to Goombungee for lunch put on by the CWA at Goombungee Public Hall. Goombungee is a quiet country town with a wide main street, a few weatherboard shops, a weatherboard pub boasting a large veranda and friendly locals. Lunch at the hall was a simple affair, but the flavour something to write home about. Something that can only come from fresh country produce and the touch of the CWA. Following lunch there was a tour of the local museum, run by volunteers who were needlessly apologetic











about the clean-up from the recent floods, very proud of their heritage but also quite vocal of their desire to remain independent from larger regional centres like Toowoomba.

The return to Toowoomba included 3 places of interest. The first was Double H Alpaca Stud.

Our hosts at Double H were keen to promote the advantages of alpaca farming over the traditional sheep wool trade and gave an informative presentation on the history of alpaca farming around the world. Questions were encouraged however there was an obvious silence when our club president persistently enquired about the taste of alpaca meat, conceding that there would be more neck chops from an alpaca than a sheep. Apart from that we discovered that an alpaca produces high quality wool in 22 natural colours. On the question on the difference between an alpaca and a lama we discovered that lamas are twice the size of alpacas and have coarse wool on their underside. Despite their small frame, I was unable to fit an alpaca in the back of my chummy before moving on to the next stop.

The next place of interest was the 2nd 2 none winery. This was a picturesque location offering not only fine wines but proudly boasted an eagle breeding program. The wine was delightful and fortunately I was able to fit a dozen in the back seat of my chummy.

The final place of interest was Colonial Woodcrafts with a magnificent display of wood carvings and furniture. There was a particularly stylish dining room table, alas it was too large for the chummy.

The final leg was a relaxing 14 mile run back through Gowrie Junction to tour headquarters at Toowoomba. We arrived with ample time to allow another good look around the town with a view to select the perfect dinner venue.

Then, back at the motel there was time for a tune up, wash and polish before putting the babies to bed for the evening. With the babies safely tucked away we headed off to The Settler's Inn for a sumptuous 350 gram Darling downs rump steak, a glass of red wine and catch up with old friends to recount a truly superb day.

Day 4 Tuesday 11th April 2017 --Woolsheds in the West, Jondaryn Woolshed, Adora Downs, Mt. Tyson, Downs Steam railway carriage dinner, Ghost tour at Royal Bulls Head Inn

A beautiful day dawned with a 127klm run to the oldest working sheep station in the Southern Hemisphere- The Jondaryan Woolshed.

We departed club headquarters at around 8.45 am and headed west through little quaint villages such as Biddeston and Linthorpe, which in their heyday would have been significant watering holes; but now with the growth of Toowoomba these sleepy little villages are soon becoming suburbs of QLD's largest inland city.

The scenery once out on the roads away from the city became extremely flat, giving credence to why the area is called the Darling Downs. I was surprised to see cotton growing in the flat fields that bordered our drive, and it was here that I saw one of the largest walking irrigators I have ever seen.

We travelled for another 50 klm or so along (what seemed to me) surreal landscaped of flat chocolate brown plains dotted with white fluffy cotton bushes, and after a few hill climbs we progressed onto the village of Jondaryan, where we stopped for morning tea and some bush activities.

The Woolshed @ Jondaryan is a working property that once was the largest woolshed in rural QLD, but now has turned itself towards a more tourism activities. A well set out venue with focus set on functions, visitors historical and heritage displays. After morning tea we were given a traditional sheep shearing demonstration which was well attended especially by the children who came on this run. Many of them had never seen a "live" sheep before and were amazed to take home a little of "real" wool.





Lunch stop was a small village called Mount Tyson. (I had to laugh because where I live we're used to real mountains, Kanangra walls, The 3 sisters, Blue Mountains etc,etc,) Mount Tyson was only a 200 metre climb passing into more grazing property rather than the flat cultivation seen earlier that morning.

Adora Downs Farm stay property was a beautiful venue set amongst rolling hills with plenty of on-site accommodation, van and bus parking and a lovely set up for weddings and private functions. Lunch here was one of the highlights of the whole rally with a beautiful roast lunch of pork, lamb and beef, well cooked vegies, thick rich gravy and finished off with toffee pudding & ice cream, tea and coffee. YUM!!

A 40 klm ride back to the club house where we participated in "Tuesday night trivia" a fun night where we sat on a table with people we'd never met before. It was a great way to meet new people and make new acquaintances. I was surprised that there were no Austin 7 or car questions, with some rather tricky ones thrown in. Our table came in 3rd from the bottom and many tins of degreaser were handed out as prizes.

Back to our caravan park for a good night's sleep ready for another day on the National rally.

For me Wednesday continued to be a day about people and some of their amazing undertakings and achievements.

Once out of Toowoomba we hurtled across the Darling Downs "on a wing and a prayer ", the prayer being that everything would hold together. Paul Boatwright evidently didn't pray hard enough and had one of his headlights let go and smash, which was a bit of a downer. At Allora Showground the cars lined up for a photo shoot and the occupants lined up for yet another amazing morning tea produced by some of those unsung heroes mentioned earlier. Travel is credited with broadening the mind and certainly Victoria was able to share with with me the design of the toilet paper holder in the Allora toilets. It was made of horse shoes and would also double as a shoe rack. Apply to Victoria for the design and John or Kath for the horse shoes!

The official photo shoot of what I believe was now 65 of the original 100 plus Austin 7's was conducted from a cage mounted on a tractor. The less professional photographers climbed the tiered seating and discovered just how hard it is to fit 65 Austin 7's into one photo.

Then we were off to the small town of Nobby for a lunch which was provided by a local group of what I would call "young people". They were very welcoming and so well organised that I thought they too should be on my list of unsung heroes. Next was "Rudds Pub". Steele Rudd (Arthur Hoey Davis) who lived in the Nobby area, wrote the "On our Selection" series creating the Dad and Dave characters who entertained the Australian generations of the early 20th centuary. Last but by no means least was the memorial to Sister Kenny, who worked from the family home in Nobby as a nursing sister. She had been encouraged to go into nursing by a Toowoomba medical doctor Aeneas McDonnell. When confronted by the needs of a local child with polio she questioned the accepted practices of restricting affected limbs in irons. Instead she applied heated rags at regular intervals to the affected limbs. It was really a form of physiotherapy and it eased the pain, which in turn enabled the sufferer to sleep. She developed these treatments in consultation with Dr Aeneas McDonnell. Typically her innovative ideas were not readily accepted in Australia, but she travelled to America where her break throughs were welcomed and practiced and from there recieved world wide acceptance. Sister Kenny is buried in the Nobby Cemetry. For such a small country location Nobby seems to have had more than its fair share of achievers!

Well the day was not yet over as we still had dinner at the Downs Steam Museum on our list, and wasn't that a revelation of what can be achieved by a group of voluteers. Fortunately words fail me and hopefully there will be some photos available to show some of their restoration achievements so far. I'm sure their plans to have the stock rolling will eventuate. Unfortunately we could not photograph the amazing carriage painted by an Aboriginal artist serving a jail sentence. If enjoying the "Orient Express "experience and eating an evening meal hosted by a voluteer entrepreneur, cooked by a voluteer chef, served by voluteer waitresses (who I'm sure all had volunteer husbands) helps the cause then I'm only too happy to have contributed and to have met yet another amazing group of people.

This was the night for the Boatwright family to experience the ghost tour, and I think this was the night that the ghost tour was taken to a whole new level. In the darkness Maureen did actually feel something unseen brush past her leg. A little later the group was treated to blood curdling screams coming from the geranium bed. The unseen ghost, three year old Emma had fallen head first into the geraniums and lost her dummy! Well done Emma, another achiever who sure knows how to liven up a ghostly experience!
