A Visit to Ireland and the Irish Austin Seven Club



Over the Christmas and New Year period, my family and I paid a visit to my wife's family in Ireland. Prior to going, I thought I might do a search on Google, to see if there was an Austin 7 Club operating on the island. After a quick search, I found that there was and made contact with a Mr William Cuddy who is the Honorary Secretary of the club. I had made prior arrangements for my family to spend 3 nights in Cork City and luckily enough, William was living just outside of Cork.

After our $3\frac{1}{2}$ hour drive and before going to the hotel, we stopped off at William's home and was introduced to his wife Valerie. We were greeted with a fabulous Irish welcome with a cuppa tea and some scones, cake and some lovely salmon and a bit of a chat.

Some time later, William took all of us to his garages to view, what I thought was one Austin 7, but low and behold, he had not only one, 1926 Austin 7 Chummy, but something what I would class, as a menagerie of automobiles. We all stood there in amazement, with William providing a commentary of each of his cars.

They ranged from; a **1947 Willys Jeep Model CJ2A** which he rebuilt in 2000, a **1980 Series 3 Land Rover 80**" which he restored in 2016 and which was originally owned by Charles Haughey who was a Prime Minister of Ireland, a **1952 Ferguson 20 TED Tractor** which he has owned for over 50 years and rebuilt it in 2019 (he uses this to mow a local village park, a **1921 Model T Delivery van** which was completely restored in 2002 (he even travelled in it





to Sweden and the UK on holidays), a 1927 Model TT one ton truck, a 1926 Model T Ford touring car which has travelled to the UK several times and a trip to Sweden, a 1925 Model T Fordor which was restored in 2010 and has been used for family weddings. baptisms and other special occasions, a 1915 Model T Ford Touring car restored in 2011 and which has travelled to Belgium, and finally a 1914 Model T Ford Touring car built on the assembly line in Manchester in January 1914 and shipped to Ireland in September 1914 and which had surpassed 1,000,000 miles back in 1942. This Model T was used to convey a former Irish President to his wedding and even the IRA had borrowed it during the Irish Troubles in 1923 and returned it after 3 weeks. with cash to pay for the "self drive hire". As you may have guessed, William is a bit of a Model T Ford collector, which he is involved in, but on a run a few years ago, he saw this little car which didn't have any mechanical problems, so he thought he might add an Austin 7 to his collection, which he did.

All in all, we spent a wonderful afternoon looking over the fine workmanship which William had carried out on his cars. We left with William asking me back the next day to go for a "jaunt around the town" in one of his cars with the top down, but alas, the weather turned, and we weren't able to enjoy the local surroundings of Cork. This has been put down as a must do on my next trip over to the Emerald Island. Many thanks to William and Valerie for their welcoming hospitality.

An Overview of Crossing The Nullarbor Plain

by Graham Burgess and Paul Pui in their Austin 7's 25 to 29 October 2017

One of our Austin 7 Club members and unstoppable adventurer, Graham Burgess, made known of his ambition to drive his Austin 7 across the Nullarbor Plain from Ceduna SA to Norseman WA, a distance of some 1200 kms, along with his fellow adventurer, Elaine Taylor.

With my own Austin 7 under restoration at the time, I (the author) saw this crossing as an opportunity to observe the car's performance and was kindly welcomed by Graham to tag along.

Meanwhile, club President, Paul Pui with his wife Amy, could not resist the temptation to join in driving their Austin 7, which had attended many club events over many years.

I had arranged to rendez-vous with Graham and Elaine at a caravan park in Dubbo on Saturday 21 October 2017, to start the journey driving to Ceduna, with Graham trailering his Austin 7 "Rita", whilst I travelled in my modern car towing a small caravan. We were to meet Paul and Amy in Ceduna three days later to begin the Nullarbor drive.

Back at the Dubbo caravan park, Graham and Elaine had not arrived as expected, when I received a call from a shaken Graham to say that a huge kangaroo had collided with their tow-car in the early morning darkness near Maitland, writing off the car and rendering it undriveable.

Somehow during the next ten hours, Graham and Elaine had purchased a replacement car, attached "Rita's" trailer to it, transferred all of their luggage and continued to Dubbo in time to depart for Wilcannia the next morning.

22 October – We had a trouble free run along the Mitchell Hwy to Nyngan and turning towards Wilcannia we met large numbers of feral goats, cats and emus. Further on, the highway resembled a kangaroo battlefield, the result of overnight strikes by heavy transports unable to avoid animals which were transfixed by headlights of oncoming vehicles. As dusk approached, we made camp 70 kms west of Wilcannia

23 October - We broke camp at 7:45am continuing west along the Barrier Highway towards Broken Hill.



More road kill requiring us to be extra vigilant as we navigated around the mounds of carcases, lest we block the trajectories of huge transports overtaking from the rear as they maintain their schedules. West of Broken Hill, there was less wildlife about, also fewer petrol stations. We gained thirty minutes crossing the border into South Australia stopping at Kimba where we free-camped for the night.

24 October - An early start today as Graham and Paul plan to reach Ceduna today (312kms) in good time to check in to the caravan park, unload the two Austin 7's from their respective trailers and conduct final checks of battery, water, oil, fuel and tyres.

25 October - Ceduna to Nundroo (191kms) a 9am start from our Ceduna park was heralded by much fanfare and photography by local residents at the sight of two Austin 7's leaving for the great unknown. Who could predict what lies in wait for these eighty nine year old tiny cars as they cross this lonely stretch of Outback Australia. These little cars whose design brief, 100 years earlier, would have been to provide basic economical transportation in a local environment supported by hundreds of dealers with access to plentiful spare parts. Driving conditions today saw an early morning temperature of 15* as drivers rugged



up to beat the cold southerly wind. Special thanks to the drivers of oncoming trucks for slowing down and moving to the shoulder, no doubt alerted to the Austins presence via bush telegraph etc. All cars arrived safely and without incident at Nundroo Roadhouse, three hours from Ceduna.

26 October - Nundroo Roadhouse to Nullarbor Roadhouse and Eucla (338kms). As both cars were performing well it was decided to continue beyond the scheduled stop at Nullarbor Roadhouse to Eucla, thereby making up for the day lost travelling to Dubbo. We would also gain an extra 1 ½ hours as we crossed the WA border to Eucla. Temperature was 30* at Nullarbor Roadhouse, with a cool change dropping to 24* approaching Eucla, helping both drivers and cars. We camped at the Eucla caravan park, excellent amenities but very dusty grounds and most sites were uneven. There was no water on site and the price was \$25/night.

27 October - Overnight at Eucla. A violent wind storm rocking my caravan and blowing dust into the van from the barren ground. Graham and Elaine's tent was blown down after midnight so sought shelter in their car to catch whatever sleep they could before morning. Eucla to Caiguna today (334 kms). These diminutive cars just keep going and going. They are dwarfed by the huge forty six wheeled road trains which give the Austin 7's a courteous wide birth. Much concentration is required by our convoy of five cars/trailers/caravan to ensure that enough space is made available for the overtaking trucks to "slot in" if required. Lunching at Caiguna roadhouse, a local commented that the two Austins would be unable to ascend Madura Pass. WRONG!

28 October - Caiguna to Fraser Range Station – this journey of 275kms marked the final leg of a remarkable trouble free run across the Nullarbor Plain. This accomplishment is testament to the outstanding design and engineering built in to the amazing Austin 7.

Congratulations to all who made this event come to fruition


